From NVQ Students to St. Tiggywinkles Nurses. . .

As you know St. Tiggywinkles is committed to the care of sick. injured and orphaned British wildlife, however we also place a great importance on teaching others this very new science. Les writes books on the subject, we present and publish papers and spend many hours answering queries from vets and other rehabbers. However, with the introduction of a National Vocational Qualification in Animal Care, placements were needed for students to learn basic husbandry and medical skills on a range of species. Everyone agrees St. Tiggywinkles fits this criteria perfectly and so in 1997 we took on a number of students from the local college. They were to be with us for four days a week with one day spent in the classroom.

The students developed at their own pace, but from the start two stood out from the rest. These were Sharon (who has written for this newsletter in the past) and Francesca. Both excelled in



different areas: Sharon is a bird fanatic and gradually took the responsibility for our Bird Nursery, while Francesca has natural leadership qualities and despite being the youngest of the group was soon made a team leader, supervising our volunteers two days a week.

During their second year the students are encouraged to learn more about the medical treatment of patients and Sharon and Francesca soon became valuable assistants to our nursing team. So much so, that when vacancies arose within the team both girls applied for the positions and were taken on, they are now both full time members of staff.

We were very proud when both Sharon and Francesca passed their NVQ exams last summer but this has now been surpassed. Both girls were invited, along with their families, to attend a recent awards ceremony at the college where they had studied. They had no idea why they were invited (although the fact that a number of St. Tiggywinkles staff were there to cheer them on should have given the game away), but were both rather nervous. They soon learned the truth as the winners of the 'Commitment to Training Awards 2000' were announced.

We are pleased and incredibly proud to say that Sharon went home with 1st

wels. However, this presents us with another problem; each of these


towels has to be washed and disinfected before it can be re-used.
